Understanding Wood by Bruce Hoadley

This is an invaluable reference book for all workers of wood. Hoadley explains everything from how trees grow to how best to cut, season, machine, join, bend, and finish wood. Although it is technical in its premise it is written in such a way (there's so much practical information given!) that it makes for a great read. The chapters on moisture and wood movement are particularly interesting.

There are also plans for a shaving horse, a spring-pole lathe, and two simple wood kilns. Anyone who knows me knows that I have a strong desire to build a chair and that this year will be the year that I tackle one or two. This book will definitely come in handy!
