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The October Meeting

This month's meeting of the Atlantic Woodworkers Association was held at Home Depot, our home away from home. The feature of the evening was a presentation by member Jay Perry, who demonstrated the Veritas Mk.II Power Sharpening System. Jay, as many of you may remember from the Seminar On Sharpening Plane Blades that I attended last year, has taught at the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design for over 20 years, works for Lee Valley and has a strong passion for planes and for keeping them very sharp. He demonstrated the sharpening capabilities of the Veritas Mk.II Power Sharpening System beginning with an old plough plane blade that was in a pretty rough state. However, after only a few seconds with the 80 grit sanding disk the rust and pits were removed. Moving on to a plane blade Jay started by lapping the back of the blade and then on to sharpening the edge. He began with the 150 grit disk, then to the 350 grit disk and finished off with the 1200 grit disk. Again, in a relatively short time the blade was ready for use: Jay sharpened a series of chisels that were sharp enough to shave with. This was verified by the several members who went home with hairless arms! Our meeting concluded with a quick auction of a couple of table saw blades and a draw for several cans of wood filler. There was also a free quart of stain for all 22 attending members.
